CHECK YOUR OWN MIND-SET

The IN-IN-IN approach can help you find your core differences so you can use them to become more open to diversity. Begin by describing a recent time when you found yourself in an uncomfortable situation with someone:
Now ask yourself these IN-IN-IN questions:
1. INterest questions:
What differences could have been contributing to this situation?
What do I know or could I ask about these differences?
2. INtrospection questions:
Why did I call these things "differences" in the first place? What is it about me that makes this a difference?
What did I learn about myself from this experience?
How do I react when I come across a difference like this?

3. INnovation questions:
How did our differences affect what we saw and felt?
What can this person teach me to help me improve my ideas? What can I offer to this person?
How might understanding and using our differences have helped us to reach a better understanding
